art 488 preparation for professional practice

Course overview

This course will focus on planning for a successful transition from academic life into professional practice as a working designer. Invited speakers from professional design practice will play a key part in panel discussions in this class.

We will cover methods for effective job-hunting, portfolio presentation and related skills, and understanding your personal strengths, weaknesses and objectives as you enter the job market. In addition we will discuss the nature of the professional design industry: what are the pros and cons of working for a design firm, as a freelancer, as a consultant, or as an in-house designer? What broader roles can the designer play? What about setting ethical boundaries on the work that you do?

Learning objectives

Through this course you should:

- · Learn from design professionals about the practice of design, and what they look for in a designer
- Refine skills for effective job hunting, including portfolio presentation skills, writing and speaking
- · Learn about different working models within the design world
- Develop plans and goals for entering the design profession and pursuing a career path suited to you and your work

Final deliverables and expectations

There is not a 'final' for this class. There will be a hand-in of materials, due at **5pm Tuesday June 7** (I will leave a box on the cupboard outside of my office, Art 249). You must submit the following:

On disk (clearly and neatly label your disk with your name and Art 488 Spring 2012):

- PDF of your résumé. (This must include your website address. Your website must be live.)
- Sampler PDF portfolio (5- to 8-page PDF, 8.5x11", showing two to three projects, which you could email to introduce your design work).
- Sample cover letter (for a job application), on letterhead that matches your resume format. This should be addressed and targeted to a real studio or firm where you would be interested to work.

Printed (b/w 8.5x11" is fine):

Top Ten Take-Aways written assignment (will be introduced later)

This course will take a seminar rather than a studio format and will involve very few critiques. The design of your portfolio materials will require independent development and will parallel the work in your other senior studio class. Active participation in class, in particular during panel discussions with outside guests, is critical to evaluating your performance.

3.9-4.0 [A] is given to a student who has exhibited the highest possible performance in all aspects of the course - the final projects, the design process and class participation are excellent. Work is prepared with care/attention to detail and presented on time for all critiques/work sessions. This student independently seeks out additional information on design topics related to the course, and is highly committed/passionate about their work.

3.5-3.8 [A-] is given to a student who exhibits superior performance in all aspects of the course - the final projects, design process, and class participation are of high quality. Work is well prepared and presented on time for all critiques/work sessions. This student has a thorough understanding of concepts being presented, and is strongly self-motivated to improve and succeed.

3.2-3.4 [B+] is given to a student who has good performance in most aspects of the course. This student follows a thorough design process, produces solid design work, and consistently participates in class. Work is prepared properly and presented on time for almost all critiques/work sessions. This student clearly understands most design concepts being presented.

2.9-3.1 [B] is given to a student who has fair performance in the course. The final work is adequate, with a design process that reflects the minimum needed to complete assignments. Work is prepared properly and presented on time for most critiques/work sessions. Participation, understanding and motivation are moderate.

2.5-2.8 [B-] is given to a student who has low performance in the course. The final work is weak in quality, with a design process that reflects inadequate exploration and development. Class participation is minimal, and reflects an incomplete understanding of concepts being presented. The student has been unprepared for critique/work sessions on several occasions (late or improper presentation).

2.0-2.4 [C+] is given to a student with poor performance in the course. Projects are of an inferior quality, and reflect a sub-standard and incomplete design process. Preparation for critique/work sessions is inadequate (late or improper presentation). This student seldom participates in class, and fails to demonstrate adequate understanding of concepts being presented. This student is not prepared for subsequent courses in design. Note that all design majors must achieve a minimum grade of 2.5 in all design studio courses. Failure to achieve this benchmark may result in required course repetition and academic probation.

0.0-2.0 [C through E] is given to a student with very low performance in the course. Projects are deficient and/or defective in quality. The design process is negligible and/or very weak. Preparation for critique and/or work sessions is inadequate (late or improper presentation). This student rarely participates in class, and demonstrates little understanding of the concepts being presented. This student is not prepared for subsequent courses in design.
