Fact and Comparison Questions to study for the exam (required)

- 1. How would you define Jainism in terms of geographic area, founder (give date + doubt), and main points of praxis and philosophy. Illustrate the philosophical points with references to the scripture you have read.
- 2. Make a comparative overview of the two main branches of Jainism (include doctrinal differences, as well as practical and canonical ones).
- 3. Outline the main doctrinal points attributed to the Buddha, and illustrate with references to the scriptures you have read.
- 4. List the similarities that Jainism and Buddhism have in common as opposed to Vedic religion.
- 5. Make a comparative overview of the differences in approach and doctrine between early Buddhism (as ascribed to the Buddha) and early Jainism (as ascribed to Mahāvīra)

Discussion questions (optional)

- 1. Outline briefly the discussion in Oxtoby 2002 (169-70 on Jainism and women. Compare with the rhetoric on Jain websites. How do you evaluate the author's argument?
- 2. Outline briefly the discussion of "Jainism in the Diaspora" in Oxtoby 2002 (191-2). What parallels do you see with what you read about the Hindu and Sikh diaspora? How do you account for the changes in emphasis?
