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Liability

- Most sanitarians are concerned with those actions and activities for which he or she may be held personally responsible;
- The administration is just as concerned with those actions of their employees for which the agency may be held liable.
- There is not a hard and fast boundary between the two.

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Responsibilities

- Certain powers and protections are derived from the legislature
- This grant of power entails certain additional responsibilities beyond those of an ordinary citizen.
- The scope of both is subject to definition and interpretation by the courts.

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Deprivation of a person's civil liberties Acting "under the color of any statute or ordinance". That is, an official can deprive a person of a Constitutional right, by improperly exercising a statutory authority, or doing something on the pretense that it is a legally authorized action. Still emerging area of law
