## Henry Schmitz Drowns While on Hunting Trip

Dr. Henry Schmitz, 72, president emeritus of the University of Washington, drowned just after 1 o'clock yesterday afternoon in wild waters off Dungeness Spit, on the Strait of Juan de Fuca.

Dr. Schmitz was pulled out into open water by a strong tide as he attempted to cross an inlet in chest-high water.

Walter W. Straley of Seattle, president of the Pacific Northwest Bell Telephone Co., made a heroic attempt to rescue Dr. Schmitz.

Dr. Schmitz and Straley were pulled from the water by the crew of a Coast Guard amphibious plane, but Dr. Schmitz apparently was dead.

"Straley still had him in a firm grip," a Coast Guard spokesman said.

DR. SCHMITZ had been hunting brant with his brother, Dietrich Schmitz, chairman of the board of the Washington Mutual Savings Bank; William S. Street, president of the United Pacific Corp.; Dean Joseph McCarthy of the U. W. Graduate School and others. They had been staying at the San Juan Gun Club north of Sequim, Clallam County.

Straley, barely conscious and suffering from shock, was taken to Olympic Memorial Hospital in Port Angeles. The hospital said he was in satisfactory condition last night.

In a telephone call to his wife, Dietrich Schmitz said he, too, nearly drowned in attempting to aid his brother but was pulled to safety by Dean McCarthy.

"I was pulled under and would have drowned, too, if Joe hadn't pulled me out," Mrs. Schmitz reported her husband as saying.

STREET, former president of Frederick & Nelson, said he and Straley had returned to the gun club before Dr. Schmitz and went out to see him to safety when they saw him wading across an inlet. A heavy tide was running and winds were as high as 53 knots, Street said.

"He (Dr. Schmitz) was standing still, when all of a sudden he went down—he was in the water," Street said. "We went for him."

Street said Straley held up Dr. Schmitz in water over both their heads and called for Street to swim back to shore for a boat. Street said he got a boat "but the current was so intense I couldn't row against it."

STREET SAID the gravel bottom may have given away beneath Dr. Schmitz' feet.

"Whether something happened to him, such as a heart attack, we don't know," Street said.

Street said Dr. Schmitz had shown no sign of not feeling in top shape during the expedition.

Gun-club members called by the Coast Guard at 1:20 o'clock.

THE CREW of the Coast Guard plane sighted Straley

and Dr. Schmitz about 300 yards offshore and set the plane down in 25-foot waves. The crew had both men out of the water by 1:45 o'clock.

The pilot, Lieut. Lloyd Wilson of Rifle, Colo., said, Straley collapsed from shock after the rescue.

The plane took Straley and Dr. Schmitz to the Port Angeles Coast Guard Station, and Straley then was taken to the hospital.

Straley is president of Century 21 Center, Inc.

Deputy Coroner Roland Blossom of Clallam County pronounced Dr. Schmitz dead.

## Soviet Premier to Visit North Viet-Nam Soon

MOSCOW, Jan. 31 (Sunday). — (AP) — Soviet Premier Alexei Kosygin will pay an official visit to North Viet-Nam, violently anti-American backer of the Communist guerrillas in South Viet-Nam. A Tass announcement this morning gave no date but

said Kosygin would leave "shortly" at the invitation of the North Viet-Namese government. Ho Chi-minh, wispy-bearded old-line Communist who was trained in Moscow, heads the Hanoi government, which, however, has taken a pro-Peking line in the ideological dispute between the Soviet Union and Communist China.

Kosygin's trip appeared to have at least two purposes: To demonstrate Soviet support for North Viet-Nam and the guerrillas battling the Saigon regime and its American advisers. To win back North Viet-Namese support in the dispute with Red China. There was considerable speculation how Kosygin could reach Hanoi without crossing territory either controlled by or sympathetic to the Red Chinese. Deputy Premier Alex-

ander Shelepin was in Outer Mongolia, on Red China's border — a region Kosygin presumably would cross. Another possibility was that Kosygin would stop in Peking to reopen "peace" talks with the Red Chinese. Red Chinese Premier Chou En-lai was here last November, and protocol would sanction such a return visit. Tass' announcement of those accompanying Kosygin made no mention of Leonid Brezhnev, who supposedly is ruling the Soviet Union with Kosygin.

In the October take-over, Brezhnev and Kosygin split Nikita Khrushchev's two top jobs. Brezhnev taking charge as party chieftain. The last previous top-level Soviet delegation to visit Hanoi was one led by former President Klement Voroshilov in May, 1957. He has visited Moscow many times in recent years.

**Japan Reports More Fallout**

TOKYO, Jan. 31.—(Sunday). — (AP) — Radioactive fallout, believed to have been caused by a recent Soviet underground nuclear blast, has been detected over Northern Japan, the Kyodo News Service reported today.

Researchers at Niigata University found an "abnormal" increase in the amount of radioactive Strontium 90 and Barium 140 in rains over the area.

Fallout previously was reported from Southern Japan.
