IV. COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is designed to build confidence in speaking Japanese. You will practice expressing your opinions on familiar subjects and recent news via group discussions, task-based role play, speeches, and conversation with native Japanese speakers. Your will learn conversation strategies and practice various speech styles from casual to very formal. You will also analyze your own speech by recording speech presentations and conversations with native speakers. To supplement these activities, there will be some reading and writing tasks.

V. COURSE OBJECTIVES

During the quarter, you will:

- (1) make comparisons and explain similarities and differences in detail;
- (2) express your opinions and rationale regarding discussion topics;
- (3) select appropriate speech styles in various situations;
- (4) make lengthy discourse by using conversational strategies;
- (5) analyze your own speech habits by recording your conversations and presentations;
- (6) give a presentation in class; and
- (7) improve your use of intermediate-level expressions and increase your range of advanced-level expressions and vocabulary.

1. Class Participation

Active class participation is mandatory. Participation counts for 2 points per class, and full points will be given only to students who participate in all class activities. Your participation points will be deducted and you will be asked to leave the classroom if you are disruptive (speaking in English, sleeping, not paying attention to the teacher, etc). Being tardy or leaving more than 10 minutes early will lower your daily participation point total by 1 point. Participating in class for less than 25 minutes will count for 0 points. Whatever the reason for your absence or tardiness, *no grading adjustment will be considered*.

2. Homework Assignments

Each assignment must be turned in on time to receive full credit. No incomplete or unsatisfactory homework will be accepted. With a single exception, *no late assignment will be accepted without proof of documented emergency*. If an assignment is due on the day when you know you will be absent, hand it in ahead of time. To accommodate a non-documented emergency or illness, one and only one late homework assignment will be accepted. Regular assignments are:

- Reading dialogues (会話) and answering questions (設問) in the textbook; and
- Reading outlines for your peers' presentations.

3. Quizzes

In each chapter, there will be 2 quizzes for new vocabulary in the textbook and new expressions in handouts. Quizzes are given at the beginning of the class. If you know you will be absent on a day when a quiz is to be given, talk to the instructor ahead of time if possible. You may make up a quiz after class on the day you first return.

4. Exams (Oral Interviews)

There will be 2 oral interviews during the quarter. *No make-up will be offered without proof of documented emergency* or official university business; talk to your instructor ahead of time if possible. *Make-up exams will be penalized:* your score will be deducted by 10% for each day after the scheduled exam day. You may be exempted from this penalty only with the instructor's consent.

5. Project 1 (Conversation with your Japanese friend)

This project is designed to help discover your speech habits and improve your specific weaknesses. You will find a Japanese conversation partner and regularly work on your weak points through speaking practices with him/her. You will record your own discourse and submit two of the recorded conversations with your analysis of them.

Late assignments will have 10% deducted from the overall score if submitted on the first day after the submission deadline; 20% on the second day. Any assignments submitted beyond the two-day grace period without documented proof will be given feedback but no credit will be given. If an assignment is due on a day when you know you will be absent, hand it in ahead of time.

6. Project 2 (Presentation)

There will be 1 presentation during the quarter. You will be asked to give a presentation on one of the topics that you read in the textbook. The project includes: researching the topic, writing your outline, giving an inclass presentation, and performing a self-evaluation of your videotaped presentation.

No late assignment will be accepted without proof of documented emergency or official university business. If an assignment is due on the day when you know you will be absent, hand it in ahead of time. No make-up presentation will be offered. Other late assignments will be penalized: each assignment will be deducted by 10% for each day after the scheduled due date; 20% on the second day. Any assignments submitted beyond the two-day grace period without documented proof will be given feedback but no credit will be given. You may be exempted from this penalty only with the instructor's consent.

7. Academic Integrity

In case of academic misconduct, such as having someone revise your writing, copying someone's homework or cheating on quizzes and exams, the offending student will be penalized in accordance with the policy of the College of Arts and Sciences (http://depts.washington.edu/grading/issue1/honesty.htm). Those who let someone copy their work also will be penalized.

VIII. EXPECTATIONS AND STUDENT RESPONSIBILITY

Regular attendance and participation as well as timely assignment submission are presumed and will enhance your ability to learn the new material presented in class. Please remember that it is not possible to recreate class activities by copying another student's notes, obtaining handouts, or visiting the instructor for a missed class. If you must miss class, it is your responsibility to find out what was covered in class and to come prepared for the next class.

1. Use of Japanese in Class

No English is allowed in class unless your instructor gives you special permission. Repeated use of English in class will affect your grade. If you have difficulty understanding what is explained or discussed in class, you may ask in English only after the instructor's permission is granted. If possible, ask clarifying questions in Japanese.

2. Preparation for Class

The schedule in XI. Course Schedule and Due Dates is tentative. Only exam dates and project due dates are indicated. The weekly schedule will be made available on the web, and further changes will be announced in class. In case you miss a class, ask a fellow student if there has been a change to the schedule. It is *your* responsibility to be aware of any schedule changes, to prepare properly, and to submit the correct homework assignments as they are due.

For undergraduate courses, one credit is generally defined as equivalent to an average of three hours of learning effort per week for one quarter. This is thought to be the minimum necessary for a student to achieve an average grade in the course. Therefore, a student taking this three-credit course, which meets for three hours a week, should expect to spend an additional 6 hours a week on coursework outside of the classroom.
