**“Adventures in Using Health IT in Primary Care Practice:
Case Studies of Seven Rural Primary Care Practices”**

Paul Gorman, M.D. is in the department of Medical Informatics and Clinical Epidemiology at Oregon Health & Sciences University. He is board certified in Internal Medicine, is a Fellow of the American College of Physicians and of the American College of Medical Informatics, and is an active member of Physicians for a National Health Program.

Dr. Gorman did formal training at Rush in Chicago, learned the realities of rural primary care on the Oregon coast in the 1980s, then completed a fellowship in General Medicine at OHSU. He currently divides his time between supervision of residents in inpatient and outpatient care, education of medical students and informatics students; and socio-technical research using naturalistic observation to understand the interaction and interdependence of information, technologies, and people in health care. Multidisciplinary collaboration significantly enriches insights, while continuing active practice keeps my work grounded in the realities of patient care (and the mixed blessing of using EHRs).
