Learning Environment in Sections:

Our goal in section is to provide an engaging learning environment where all students feel welcome and are able to share their viewpoints, to learn, and to participate. Section is an opportunity to grapple with course ideas, listen to various reflections on the course material, and ask questions. We acknowledge that we all have different life experiences, and sometimes discussing the topics in this class can be very difficult or controversial, and may invoke divergent and strong opinions.

It is vital to recognize that we must engage each other in section in a manner that is respectful and promotes a positive learning environment where open discussion can occur. We should not and cannot make assumptions about other students when they are sharing their viewpoints and react based on those assumptions. We are free to disagree with one another, but it is necessary to do so in manner that does not disrupt the important work of section, and does not marginalize any students or involve personal attacks. There are constructive ways to offer a differing viewpoint and critiques. It is also important to remember that it is not possible for every person in this class to always agree on every issue, topic, or reading, etc., since there are a range of different viewpoints on these issues in the public and among scholars who do research on these issues.

I am confident that everyone in this class can and will positively contribute to robust and meaningful discussions.

I ask that we all try to gain one another's confidence and respect one another's privacy. Toward those ends, I will not make any posts about any of you this quarter, and I will ask that you do the same so that we can speak freely and learn together. Should you have any problems or complaints about something that occurs in section, please notify me right away, and I will do my utmost to facilitate a resolution.
