Beaver teeth marks, most are old & some are fresh:

We found several large pieces of fur at the base of 2 different trees – old coyote scat? owl pellet? Mystery as fur seems so long....



Large size, near beach:



Large size on path near freshwater pond:



Best guess: Raccoon It looks like it has seeds & fish scales.

Their scat is often described as thick, tube-like scat.

Medium sized, on path near freshwater pond:



Best guess: Virginia Opossum

Tiniest of all on path near freshwater pond:



Best guess: Long-tailed Weasel scat is brown to black and contains bones &/or hair. Scat is twisted, thin & tapered at ends, 1/8 inch in diameter and 1 to 1 1/2 inches long.
